### Benenden Primary School:

A public meeting was held in the Village Hall on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> June, to discuss the possibility of a new village Primary School. The meeting was opened by the Chair of the Governors, Rev. Christopher Smith. He explained that a new school has been discussed as long ago as the 1930's. It was discussed again in both the 1960's and the 1980's. However, following the 2003 Ofsted report, the need for a new school has become more urgent. This report was excellent in all areas except the facilities, which fall well below the standards of both the County Council and the Department for education and skills. Nearly all of these problems relate to the limited size of the buildings used. There is currently under 600 square metres of teaching space, when there ought to be 1200 square metres. The school office is currently in the corridor, there is no designated first aid area, and the kitchen and dining area is also used as the Reception class room. Several teachers then spoke in detail about the problems they face on a day to day basis working and caring for children in this environment.

Kent County Council has now asked David Hicken, a Planning and Development Consultant, to look at the feasibility of building a new school in the village. Mr Hicken explained that any new site has to be able to accommodate not only the new school buildings, but also external hard surfaces for play and sport, playing fields and car parking. It also needs to be situated in an area which is well related to the village accessible by both foot and car. It also needs to be capable of accommodating future expansion of the school and an enabling development such as key worker housing.

The three proposed sites are at Walkhurst Road, the Glebe Field and on the land adjoining the recreation ground. All sites have both advantages and drawbacks, and the project is still at a very early stage, so it is possible that other sites may be considered in the future. However, it is hoped that funding will be made available from the County Council in 2006 and the target date for completion of the new school is in 2008.

### Benenden Exhibition:

There will be a Benenden Exhibition on display at the Cranbrook Museum during the whole of October, which is being organised by BACS. Various items, drawings and documents will be on display at this exhibition. The star exhibit will be the drawings of the Benenden Steeple, the story of which features at the end of this newsletter.

As part of this event, there will be a wine and cheese evening at the Museum on 7<sup>th</sup> October at 7.30pm. Tickets are available at £5 each for this evening. However, numbers are limited to 40 people, due to limitations of space. Tickets can be purchased on a first come first served basis from Dick Hill, who will issue a receipt to be used as a ticket on the door.

### **Village Trails:**

A booklet containing all the Village Trails, which have been serialised in this newsletter, has now been published. This is on sale locally at £3 each. You should buy one soon if you would like a copy, as at least 75 of the 200 have been sold already.

### **Planning Matters:**

### **Broadband Update:**

Following the Broadband Article which was published in issue 42, BT have now announced that they have scrapped the 'trigger levels' which were needed for Broadband to be enabled in rural towns and villages have been scrapped. In other words, there is no longer any need to register an interest in Broadband, as it will be made available in every Kent community over the next year anyway.

Partly as a result of pressure from the Kent County Council, BT have produced a schedule for enabling Broadband in each and every community, which does not currently have access to this high speed internet connection. According to this, Benenden and Iden Green are due to be 'Broadband enabled' in May 2005.

### Autumn Walk:

A walk to ruins of Camber Castle has been proposed for the BACS Autumn Walk. This will take place on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> October at 2pm. More details will be made available in the Parish Magazine and the two local papers when this has been confirmed.

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## The Benenden Steeple:

As most people will know, Benenden once possessed a remarkable detached timber steeple, about twenty feet from the body of the church at its north-west corner. Contemporary comments include *"The Steeple of this Church standeth off from the same and is of rare and remarkable workmanship in the inside therof ....."* (from Kilburne's *Survey of Kent*, 1659), *"For beauty the second in the realm"* and *"...a serviceable sea mark from Hyth to Dungeness Point"*. Benenden is some eighteen miles from that stretch of coast. It must have been a remarkable structure.

The 17<sup>th</sup> Churchwardens' accounts for Benenden are generally concerned with matters such as *"Item to James Turner for one days work in diking in ye churchyard, 1s 2d"* and *"Item payd to severall p-sons for foxes heads, grays heads & crows, magpyes & other vermines 16s 4d"*, and with the regular collection of the church rates from the property owners in the parish.

Abruptly, at the end of 1672, the accounts are interrupted by a page of dramatic writing, beginning –

*"Munday the 30<sup>th</sup> day of December 1672 between Twelve and one in the morning Arose a storm of Lightning and thunder, a hard gale of wind, some raine out of the South west, which set fire to the steeple at Benenden whereby the said Steeple with the Roof and all the Timber worke of the Church was Consumed in 4 or 5 howers time; the five large bells melted; also five houses ajoyning the Churchyard Gate on the north side burnt to the Ground; the Steeple was built all of timber ....."*

It continues with a description of the structure of the timber steeple. We do not know who wrote this, but clearly it was intended as a record for future generations.

In the course of time, the churchwardens' accounts were lost. Some Victorian antiquarians knew of reports of a great detached steeple at Benenden, but dismissed them, suggesting that Kilburne's description was intended for the much more modest detached timber steeple at Brookland, even though Kilburne lived in Hawkhurst. Then in 1896, the Churchwardens' Accounts were rediscovered and the historical reality of the detached steeple was accepted (article in *Archeologia Cantiana*, 1897).

A local timber steeple which has survived is at High Halden. Although this is attached to the church, it has strong structural similarities to Benenden's (so experts tell me). The High Halden steeple is very much smaller, about 70 feet high compared with Benenden's estimated 132 feet. The surviving detached steeple at Brookland, of a very different structure, is about 75 feet high.

The written description of the steeple is sufficiently detailed for reconstructive drawing. This has now been done by Jill Atherton, who has previously made superb architectural drawings (including reconstructions) for great buildings such as Chichester Cathedral and Westminster Abbey. We will feature the Benenden steeple drawing at the Benenden week exhibit at Cranbrook museum in October. In a sense it is a tribute to the Benenden man who described the building while it was fresh in his memory.
